* Bring a signed blue card and a worksheet. Radio can be completed at JOTA and requires a radio contact which can be made either before or after the time of the clinic. Communications cannot be completed at JOTA.



More Details

Camping spots are available, but you need to provide everything else: plan, purchase, and cook your own meals, bring all necessary water for cooking and cleanup, and bring tents and sleeping bags.

Radios and computers will be provided. Attendees don't need a ham license. Scouts will operate radios under the supervision of licensed hams.

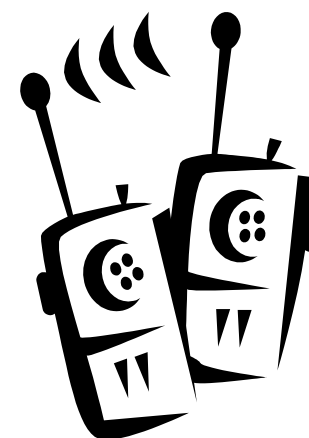
Directions

- 1) From Woodinville head to Duvall
- 2) Go south on State Route 203 (Main St).
- 3) Left on Stephen's Street. This is the first light. (Zero your odometer) Stephen's becomes NE 152nd then 275th Ave.,
- 4) Left on NE 150th St. Don't miss the stop signs. (They can be a bit hidden behind trees.) Pass Cedarcrest High School @ 1.7miles.
- 5) Go past the large white gate indicating private property. Leave the paved road and begin driving on a dirt road.
- 6) Turn right at the "T" intersection
- 7) Take the first left @ 2.1 miles & follow the dirt road (NE 147th Pl. no sign). You'll pass a house or 2, go around a curve to right and then left and up small grade.
- 8) Look for the red arrow on the left side pointing to Mountain Meadows Camp @ 2.8 miles. Follow the red arrows.
- 9) The Blue, Red & Yellow Gate is on the left @ 2.9 miles. Go down the hill. Parking at 3.3 miles.

JOTA / JOTI

The Jamboree on the Air (JOTA) is an annual event in which Scouts all over the world speak to each other by means of amateur (ham) radio contacts. Not only is it fun to talk to Scouts from other parts of the world but it provides also a chance to find out about other countries and about Scouting elsewhere.

The Jamboree on the Internet (JOTI) runs at the same time but uses computers for communications instead of radios. We will have stations set up for both JOTA and JOTI.

The Northlakes District will be hosting this event at Mountain Meadows in Duvall. Setup will be Friday night and the event will run until Sunday afternoon. Stop by for an hour or camp out all weekend.

What is Ham Radio

It's the most fun you can have with a radio. It's a way to talk to people around the world, or even orbiting the world; to send e-mail without any sort of internet connection, and to keep in touch with friends while you're driving around town. But it's also a very important communications system -- when cell phones don't work, regular phones don't work, the internet doesn't work, ham radio works. There are many aspects of ham radio such as:

- Talk all over the Puget Sound & the world with a handheld radio
- World Wide Communications
- Emergency Communications
- Talk to Satellites & the Space Station
- Bounce Radio off of the Moon
- Build your own Radio
- Radio Tracking

Operating a ham radio requires a license that can easily be obtained by kids. If you are interested in getting a license, www.lakewashingtonhamclub.org has classes geared towards kids.

Registration

Registration is \$2 on-site to cover the cost of cleaning the kybos. **If you will be working on a Merit Badge you need to bring a blue card & a printed merit badge worksheet.** The worksheet I prefer is at www.woodinillescouting.org. If you are a Cub Scout, you should bring your book for advancement!

If you wish to order patches or cards, you can do so directly from BSA. The JOTA contact cards are 10 cents each. I have cards from last year I'll hand out for free. The patches are temporary insignia to be worn on the right pocket of the Scout uniform or on jackets/vests, and they cost \$4 each. Both the contact cards and patches are available in LIMITED QUANTITY, so order early!
